ORACLE: A FIREWISE COMMUNITY

After three years of outstanding accomplishments towards becoming a safer community, Oracle was nationally recognized in January of 2006, as a Firewise community. Former Governor Napolitano presented the



community of Oracle with a plaque which is proudly displayed in the fire station office.

Oracle's Firewise program started off with just a handful of concerned citizens, who cared enough about their community and about their safety to do something about it themselves.

Several public meetings and Firewise workshops were held in

2003 and 2004 to promote wildfire awareness, and to provide fire prevention education. Many Oracle citizens stated during these meetings, that they would be glad to participate in the Firewise program, but they needed a method to dispose of their tree trimmings.

An existing brush disposal

program was relocated and expanded to the west end of American Avenue, where it still operates today. Information regarding the brush disposal program can be found at the www.oraclefire.org website, or by contacting the Oracle Fire Department at 896-2980.

In many cases, advance preparation for a wildfire can be done inexpensively, and in just a few short days. Sometimes just simple, basic landscaping and yard cleaning can make a huge difference in how your home would survive a wildfire.

Recent fires in Australia, and even more recent fires in Texas, should serve as a wakeup call for those living in Oracle who have

not yet prepared their homes and properties for the very real possibility of a catastrophic wildfire.

The Oracle Fire Department will gladly provide a courtesy Firewise Evaluation of your home and property.

A composting pit has recently been added to the Brush Disposal site. The pit will accept non-brush items such as grasses, leaves, and livestock manure. Once the composting process is complete, local gardeners will be allowed to remove the compost to use in their gardens.

It is located just inside of the Brush Disposal Site entrance gate. When empty, the pit measures 30 feet by 30 feet by 4 feet deep, and will hold approximately 133 yards of compost material. A sloped ramp allows vehicles to back down into the pit to unload composting material. Additional material will be accepted until the pit reaches near full capacity. Then another layer of dirt will be spread, covering the entire area. The site is graded to allow rain water runoff from the access road to keep the compost wet.

RULES . . . The site is open to residents of Oracle. Items gladly accepted are: tree trimmings and brush.

Items NOT accepted are cactus, garbage, lumber, stumps, paper, plastics, metal, fluids and site cleaning materials. Grass, leaves, and weeds go to our new compost area.


Traci is a third-generation firefighter, with her oldest daughter soon to become

TRAINING AT OFD

Oracle Fire Department has been hosting Arizona Fire I & II, EMS First Responder, EMT-B, and Healthcare Provider CPR classes through Central Arizona College since 2002. Basic Wildland Firefighter and other wildland classes have also been held here.

CPR and Basic First Aid classes are now being provided for the public. Sign forms are available at the station.

OFD personnel are encouraged to continue training throughout their career. Selected firefighters are allowed to attend the Wildfire Academy each year in Prescott, Arizona and the Arizona State Fire School in Mesa, Arizona. Several OFD firefighters have recently completed advanced training, such as Swift Water Rescue and

other technical rescue classes. Three inhouse drills are provided each month. Drill schedules are posted in the Captains Office, listed on the "shift schedule" and also announced each month at our public meeting. Firefighters wishing to remain on the shift schedule are required to attend at least one drill per month.

CERT News: CERTs are a group of people trained to assist the fire dept. but for non-hazardous duties. CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) members have had classes in first aid, safety procedures, incident assistance, and other venues. Ongoing classes and training continue as often as time allows. This fall, a visit to local schools showing the use of fire extinguishers by CERTs Doug Johnson and Vivien Mayer was a success. Getting people comfortable with the extinguisher was the goal.

ANNUAL EVENTS



BEING FIREWISE

What does "being firewise" mean? Firewise people create "defensible space" around their homes – meaning that you have a 30-foot perimeter of space around your home that is lean, clean and green. Lean means you prune back shrubs and tree branches within 15 feet of any structures. Clean means you clean out dead plant material from around your home. Green means you have planted fire-resistant vegetation and are keeping it healthy and green.

Make sure your home is properly house-numbered for emergency access and has its entryway clear from flammable material. Most of all, have a plan in case you need to evacuate due to fire.

Before you are confronted with an emergency, have the following emergency plans in place. Take into consideration family health needs of specific family members who may suffer from disabilities or medical conditions.

- Post your local non-emergency fire (896-2980) and sheriff (520-866-5111) numbers by your home phone and program them into your cell phone. Consult our website for more information. www.oraclefire.org
- Decide where you will go or meet in case of a fire and plan how you will get there.
- Plan for your pets and their safety as well. Portable cages should be handy.
- In case of fire, have tools available such as a shovel, rake, axe, handsaw, chainsaw and a 2-gallon bucket.
- Have on hand: flashlights and extra batteries, a first aid kit, a dust mask to help filter air, wrenches or pliers to turn off utilities, battery or a hand-crank radio with extra batteries, local maps and if possible a

three-day supply of non-perishable food and plenty of water.

Oracle Union Church is a good example of a firewise property.

Congressional Recognition Award for outstanding service to the community. At that time OFD was the only fire department in Arizona to have received an award of this type.


Oracle's fuel thinning crew (aka Florence Wildland Fire Crew) was temporarily re-assigned to work on a project in Marana for the new "Super Tanker."

Dropping of slurry (fire retardant) from the aircraft required thousands of cups to be placed on the ground to



determine the effectiveness of the slurry. Wildland crews provided labor to help with the testing project.
